This year saw us launch IgniteMO, JP's innovative loan participation product that leverages our own capital resources along with federal, state and private investment. Through IgniteMO, JP is able to advance a stronger more inclusive economy by offering more capital to rural business owners and their families. While we celebrate the more than \$13 million that JP has deployed to over 600 rural small business owners we remain intentional in extending the reach of capital to support more family economies which in turn support local community economies.

Our JP Mission calls us to connect our clients with community resources. For years federal resources from the Small Business Administration (SBA) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) have loaned JP affordable capital for our rural lending efforts. Other companions, the business assistance organizations that work with thousands of rural small business owners, offer JP ready clients that are prepared for the realities of business ownership. We are honored to work with the likes of the West Plains, Missouri based Ozarks Small Business Incubator (OzSBI; ozsbi.com), and the many Small Business Development Centers (SBDC) that work with rural small business owners through higher education facilities throughout Missouri and Illinois.

We are most grateful to our Justine PETERSEN and Great Rivers Community Capital Board Members who remain purposeful, resolute and always friendly in offering prudent counsel and consistent support toward our JP Mission of change. This year we especially honor Mr. Eddie Davis who retired after serving multiple terms as JP Board Chair. IN TROY, MO, has been owned and operated by Katrina Walters for nearly five years. Katrina's journey with the shop began when she inherited it from her mother-in-law. She initially started at the business by assisting part-time and organizing the dresses. However, when the keys were handed over to her, Katrina recognized that she had a vision for something more ambitious.

With limited working capital, she set out to find funding that would help her bring that dream to life. Initially, Katrina experienced some difficulty acquiring the working capital she needed to revitalize the boutique. Turned away from several large banks, she finally found a solution at Justine PETERSEN. Katrina secured a SBA loan, which allowed for multiple shop improvements, including new signage, fresh carpet, and an updated interior.

Thanks to the loan, which Katrina states, "Could not have come at a better time," the business was able to continue its legacy.

More than just a wedding shop, Elegance Made Simple is Katrina's creative outlet. Since her loan with JP, Katrina has expanded the shop's offerings to include bridal parties and groomswear, all with the goal of making the experience seamless and personal for her clients. PULSE MEDICAL STAFFING, LLC IS A PREMIER MEDICAL STAFFING AGENCY LOCATED IN COLUMBIA, MISSOURI, AND SERVES MANY RURAL AREAS.

The agency provides essential temporary staffing solutions to various healthcare services, including hospitals, clinics, physician offices, and long-term care centers. Established in 2008 and commencing operations in 2010, Pulse Medical Staffing, led and founded by Dan Latham-Smith, has consistently demonstrated resilience, adaptability, and financial growth.

In 2023, Pulse Medical Staffing, LLC was facing financial setbacks due to the rising costs of insurance (tripling between 2021 and 2023). As a result, the business was forced to secure an online loan at a high 39% interest rate. He could barely keep up with the monthly payments.

Justine PETERSEN provided Pulse Medical Staffing, LLC a much-needed affordable working capital loan and relief. It enabled Pulse to help 27 job applicants to start work, helping to purchase scrubs, provide transportation, and pay for CPR certification costs. It also enabled Mr. Latham-Smith to attend industry conferences where he gained access to new clients.


